Conference speaker panel



Laura Burke was appointed by the Minister for the Environment as Director General of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in November 2011. Laura joined the EPA in 2004, as the Director of the EPA's Office of Communications and Corporate Services. She took over the position of Director of the EPA's Office of Climate, Licensing and Resource use in August 2008. Laura is a Chemical Engineering graduate from University College Dublin and holds an MSc from Trinity College Dublin. Before joining the EPA in September 2004, Laura worked in the private sector, mainly in waste management.



Vincent Carragher is currently a research scholar at UCD, having previously worked with Tipperary Energy Agency for seven years fostering renewable energy, energy efficiency and sustainable behaviour change with communities. Vincent's areas of research are based in community facilitation and resource consumption analysis. In his presentation Vincent will review his experience over the last 12 years facilitating close to 130 communities to lower their emissions.



Caitriona Carlin is an EPA-funded postdoctoral researcher based at the Applied Ecology Unit, School of Natural Sciences, NUI Galway. With colleagues from the Centre for Health from Environment, Ryan Institute, NUI Galway, she leads research investigating the benefits to health from biodiversity. She also coordinates the University of Limerick and NUI Galway joint MSc in Sustainable Resource Management: Policy and Practice.



Matthew Crowe was appointed in March 2010 as a Director of the EPA with responsibility for the Office of Communications and Corporate Services and is currently Director of the Office of Environmental Assessment. Prior to being appointed Director, Matthew had worked within the EPA since 1995 in a variety of roles. Prior to joining the EPA he worked in Vancouver, Canada, for five years, conducting contract research in applied environmental sciences.



Jonathan Derham who is an NUI graduate, has 22 years experience in waste management and industrial regulation, both in the public and private sector nationally and internationally. He joined the EPA in 1995, has been involved in regulatory aspects of most of the major waste infrastructure in the State. He is currently active in the national and EU waste policy areas.



Mark H. Durkan, MLA is Environment Minister in the Northern Ireland Executive, a role he was appointed to in July 2013. He has served as an SDLP MLA for Foyle since 2011 and served as the party's social development and health spokesperson. His ministerial responsibilities cover the natural environment, built heritage, planning, local government, road safety and the regulation of drivers and vehicles.



Frances Fahy is a Senior Lecturer and Head of Geography at the National University of Ireland, Galway. Frances' primary research interests are in the field of sustainable consumption and environmental planning, specifically the social and cultural consequences of environmental change. She is the cluster leader of the Planning and Sustainability Research Cluster in Geography at NUIG. Frances is the past President of the Geographical Society of Ireland (2012-2014) and a past Chair of the Planning and Environment Research Group (PERG) of the Royal Geographical Society in the UK (2007-2012).



John Fitzgerald was appointed as the Director of Grid Development at EirGrid in February 2013. He had previously held the position of Project Director of the East West Interconnector since 2007. Prior to joining EirGrid, John worked in business development for ESB International and was Business Development Manager, Manager for Trading and Supply (Northern Ireland) and Commercial Manager for Coolkeeragh ESB. John has been involved in the development of major energy infrastructure projects and corporate initiatives such as the Coolkeeragh 400MW CCGT.



Grace Glasgow is Director, Water Environment at RPS. With over 24 years' experience, Grace Glasgow leads a team of over 40 engineers and environmental scientists with a focus on catchment management, river modelling, flood risk and hydrology. Grace is currently project manager for the delivery of South Eastern, Eastern and North Western Neagh Bann CFRAM Studies for the Office of Public Works in support of Ireland's implementation of the EU Floods Directive. Grace is also project Director for the SEPA and Rivers Agency Frameworks for Flood Risk Management providing technical support in the UK's implementation of the Floods Directive.



Mark Gough is the Executive Director of the Natural Capital Coalition, a role he took on in March 2015. Mark previously worked for The Crown Estate, helping to develop its integrated vision and approach to value measurement. Prior to this he was the Global Environmental Manager for Reed Elsevier. Mark is a Director of the Aldersgate Group and has sat on a number of national and international committees, including the Steering Committee of the United Nations CEO Water Mandate and the Board of the Alliance for Water Stewardship.



Alison Hester is Head of Theme: 'Safeguarding Natural Capital' at the James Hutton Institute. She also serves on several national and international Committees, Boards of Management and Steering groups, including the UK Biodiversity Science Committee, the Natural Capital Initiative Secretariat, the Scottish Biodiversity Strategy Natural Capital Committee and ALTER-Net: Europe's Ecosystem Research Network. Alison has over 25 years' research experience, with an international reputation in applied biodiversity research.



Mary Hughes is the President of the Irish Planning Institute and Managing Director of HRA | Planning, a town planning and environmental consultancy based in Limerick which she established in 2005. The firm specialises in environmental planning and employs planning consultants who have upskilled and retrained as ecologists to address the many new environmental challenges facing planning. She began her career as a planner in local government before moving to the private sector where she worked for a multi-disciplinary consultancy specialising in transport and planning for three years.



Alan Kelly, TD was appointed as Minister for Environment, Community and Local Government in July 2015, having previously been Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport with special responsibility for public transport and commuter affairs. He was elected TD for North Tipperary in 2011 and before that was an MEP for Munster/Ireland South, during which time he was a member of a number of key committees in the European Parliament.



Mary Kelly was appointed Chairperson of the Board of An Bord Pleanála in August 2011. She had been the Director General of the Environmental Protection Agency since May 2002. She holds a PhD in Chemistry from Trinity College Dublin, and an MBA from Dublin City University. Mary previously worked with IBEC, the Irish Business and Employers Confederation, where she was responsible for environmental policy, and before that in the pharmaceutical industry. She was elected to membership of the Royal Irish Academy in 2008 and has served on the Council of the Academy.



Dara Lynott is Deputy Director-General of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and is Director of the EPA's Office of Climate, Licensing, Research and Resource Use. This Office is responsible for the climate change programme in the EPA, co-ordination of water and sustainability research, authorisation of specified activities including IPPC licensing and activities that underpin national resource efficiency policy objectives.



Jock Martin is Head of Integrated Environmental Assessments at the European Environment Agency and is lead author of the European state of the environment and outlook (SOER) 2015 report. He has been involved in environmental statistics, indicators and assessments since 1991, initially at the Department for the Environment in the UK. He was also EEA National Focal Point (NFP) for the UK from 1991-1997. Since joining the EEA in 1997 he has been strongly involved in building capacities in the EEA's network of 33 member countries. He has also authored several integrated assessment reports focused on environment, well-being and economic interactions.



Brendan McGrath is Chief Executive at Galway City Council. He has been in his current role since June 2013 and has more than 37 years' experience in Local Government across nine different county and town authorities. He worked for Meath County Council for almost 21 years and was Acting County Manager in 2012. Prior to this, Brendan held the roles of Director of Services for Planning and Transportation, Housing, Water Services, Environment, Fire and Emergency Planning and Community and Enterprise. He has also worked in Wexford, Roscommon, Galway County and Kildare.



Michael McNicholas was appointed CEO of Bord Gáis Éireann (now Eirvia) in May 2013. Prior to joining Bord Gáis Michael held the positions of CEO and Chief Operating Officer during his time at NTR plc. Before he joined NTR plc in 2010, Michael worked with ESB for 26 years, including 10 years as an Executive Director. Michael has over 30 years' experience in the Irish and International energy industry where he has held senior positions with responsibility for general management, organisational change, delivery of major capital projects, funding, international growth, managing regulatory environments and competing in open energy markets.



Tomás Murray is an ecologist with the National Biodiversity Data Centre, a national organisation that collects and manages data on Ireland biodiversity. Prior to this, Tomás was an Assistant Professor in Zoology in the University of Halle-Wittenberg where his primary research interests were the interaction of genetic, species and community diversity and the provision of ecosystem services. Currently, his core responsibilities within the Data Centre is the co-ordination of national citizen science-driven biodiversity monitoring schemes, data analysis and mobilisation, and he is a member of the Steering Committee of the Irish Forum on Natural Capital.



Gabriel Nelson is Assistant Director, Water Management and Senior Principal Scientific Officer at the Northern Ireland Environment Agency, a role he has held since 2012. He has over 36 years' experience in environmental related work, primarily in the protection and regulation of the water environment. As Principal Scientific Officer from 2008-12 he was responsible for the development, publication and implementation of the Northern Ireland River Basin Management Plans to meet the requirements of the Water Framework Directive.



Rory O'Donnell, is Director of the National Economic and Social Council (NESC). The Council is Ireland's sustainable development advisory council. In 2012, the NESC Secretariat prepared a report for the Government entitled Ireland and the Climate Change Challenge: Connecting 'How Much' with 'How To'. In 2014 the Council published a report on community engagement in wind energy development. It is currently undertaking further work on climate change policy, including a focus on the formulation of sectoral plans.



Emyr Roberts has been Chief Executive of Natural Resources Wales (NRW) since April 2013. NRW is the main environmental agency in Wales, with a combination of regulatory, advisory, scientific, incident response, land management and enterprise functions. Emyr has led the successful transition from the three legacy bodies into NRW. He was previously Chief Executive of the Welsh European Funding Office in 2003. Within the Welsh Government, Emyr has been Director of the Department for Social Justice and Local Government; and Director General, Public Services and Local Government Delivery.



Deborah Spence is head of the Planning and Environment Group at Arthur Cox. She and her team advise on all aspects of planning and environmental law, including waste management liability, corporate regulatory compliance, contaminated sites liability, all aspects of permitting and licensing, environmental impact assessment and environmental and planning issues arising in major infrastructural projects.



Hendrik W van der Kamp is a practicing town planner and the Head of School of Spatial Planning in Dublin Institute of Technology. He has 25 years experience in professional planning practice in Ireland and has worked in Cork County Council, An Foras Forbartha, An Bord Pleanála, UCD and DIT.



Eamon Ryan is the Leader of the Green Party. He was a TD from 2002 until 2001 and was Minister for Communications, Energy & Natural Resources from 2007 until 2011. He has spent the last twenty years working at the highest policy level in local government, the Dáil, the Council of Ministers, and more recently in some of the most influential organisations in the world. Eamon chairs the Digital and Climate Policy Groups for the Institute of International and European Affairs and currently works with E3G, ranked as one of the world's top 15 environmental think tanks.



Michael Starrett is the Chief Executive of the Heritage Council of Ireland. He has over 35 years' experience in the areas of natural and cultural heritage management and policy development. In addition to a career path that has seen him work in Northern Ireland, Scotland and the Republic of Ireland, he has extensive European experience through his membership of the Federation of National and Nature Parks of Europe, a pan European body with 400 members in 38 different countries. He is also a member of the IUCN's World Commission on Protected Areas.



Martin Tynan is General Manager of Virginia Ingredients and the Wexford Creamery Business Units within Glanbia since April 2011. Glanbia is a leading international dairy and nutritional ingredients company headquartered in Ireland. Previously Martin was HR Director at Glanbia plc from 2005-2011 and before that held a number of engineering and environmental management roles.



Dave Walsh is Assistant Secretary in the Environment Division in the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government, with specific responsibility for all environmental policies in areas such as waste and resource efficiency, climate change, air quality, nuclear and radiation matters, environmental policy and research, as well as engagement at EU and UN levels on environmental issues.



Paddy Woodworth is an author, journalist, lecturer and tour guide. He has written for the Irish Times, International Herald Tribune, Vanity Fair, The Scientist, The Sunday Times, Ecological Restoration, The World Policy Journal and BBC Wildlife. He broadcasts for RTE, the BBC and US networks. He has written two books on the Basque Country, and most recently a study of ecological restoration projects worldwide, Our Once and Future Planet (U of Chicago Press 2013).

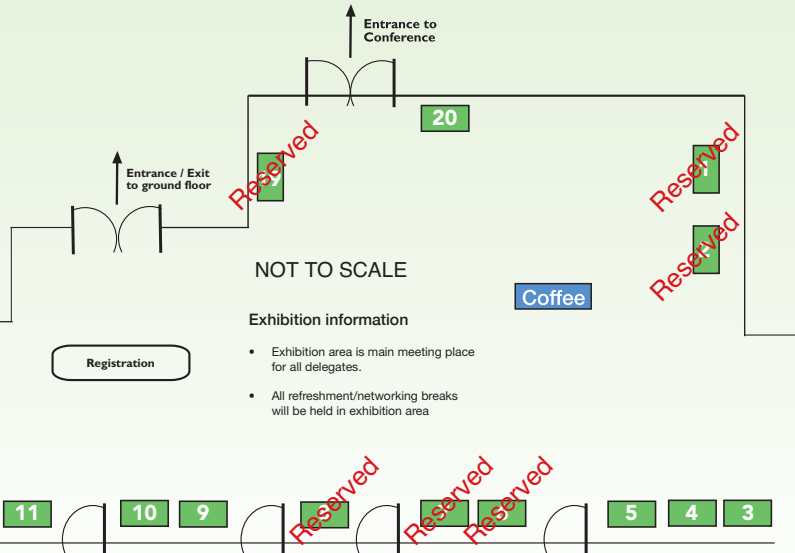

By train

The closest railway station is Drumcondra at the intersection of Drumcondra Road (N1) and Clonliffe Road, a 5 minute walk from the stadium. This station is served by Arrow trains. The closest DART stations are Connolly and Clontarf. Connolly is a 15-20 minute walk and Clontarf a 20-25 minute walk to the stadium. The closest LUAS and Intercity Rail stop is also at Connolly Station.
