Listed contractors have successfully completed the Government's National Radon Control Strategy Radon Remediation Training Course, including the assessment; provided evidence of current tax compliance; provided evidence of public liability and employer liability insurance and agreed to comply with the Terms and Conditions of the scheme. Choosing a contractor

It is important to note that the Environmental Protection Agency does not warrant the services being provided by any registered contractor. Further details of this registration scheme are available on www.radon.ie.

When choosing a remediation company, we recommend that you discuss the following with the contractor:

- Fan warranty and maintenance (for active sumps)
- Costs of running fans (for active sumps)
- Fan noise – if possible fans should be located away from bedrooms as they may be heard especially at night (for active sumps).
- Post remedial measurements
- What steps may be taken and the potential cost (if any) if further work is needed following re-measurement

After the remediation work is finished

- It is important to re-measure your home after the work is completed. This will determine if the radon level is below 200 Bq/m³. The EPA provides a free post-remediation measurement service to homeowners.
- Normally remediation is successful at the first attempt. However, sometimes more work is needed to reduce the radon levels to below 200 Bq/m³.
- There is no absolute certainty that radon will be reduced to below 200 Bq/m³ even following a number of remediation attempts. While this rarely happens, it is important to note that any significant reduction in radon levels will reduce your risk of lung cancer even if the levels are not reduced below 200 Bq/m³.
