








How the Household Waste Data was collected




The EPA studies the type of waste placed in household, business and school bins every four years. Household and commercial bins are collected from around the country and are sorted, by hand, into the different types of waste (e.g., food, plastic, paper). The results of the 2022 Household Municipal Waste Characterisation are summarised in this booklet. Further detailed information on the municipal waste characterisation is available on the EPA Waste Statistics webpage.



The waste samples were sourced from 12 companies at 17 waste collection centres nationwide.

The samples were from areas representative of the average socioeconomic group (CSO, 2016).











Five target routes identified per sample, representative of waste & collection types & demographics.



A 400 kg grab sample taken from each collection route was stored.



The grab samples were mixed and divided into a representative 100 kg sample.




Each 100kg sample was sorted into 81 categories, with each weight recorded to data sheets.




All data was inputed into waste characterisation database.






What is in Ireland's Recycling Bin?




What should not be in the Recycling Bin






What is in Ireland's Organic Waste Bin?




What should not be in the Organic Waste Bin





National Profile for Kerbside Collected Household Waste








Household waste changes since 2018

Overall there have been minor changes in the composition of Ireland's kerbside household waste since 2018. These changes include:





What the waste industry needs to do?

Householders need more support from industry to make waste segregation easier.



Provide organic waste bins to all households to make food waste segregation easier.



Targeted awareness campaigns to educate and motivate householders waste to segregate food waste.



Improved and more transparent waste collection charging to incentivise and reward waste segregation and reduction.

What government needs to do?



Enforcement of the provision of organic waste bins to all houses and apartments.

Improved recycling infrastructure to make it easier for householders to use bring centres.

What householders need to do?



Put food and garden waste into organic waste bins or home compost.



Put clean, loose & dry recyclables into the recycling bin.



Bring bulky waste, glass, textiles, batteries & electronics, and hazardous waste to bring centres.
